03. Building construction site

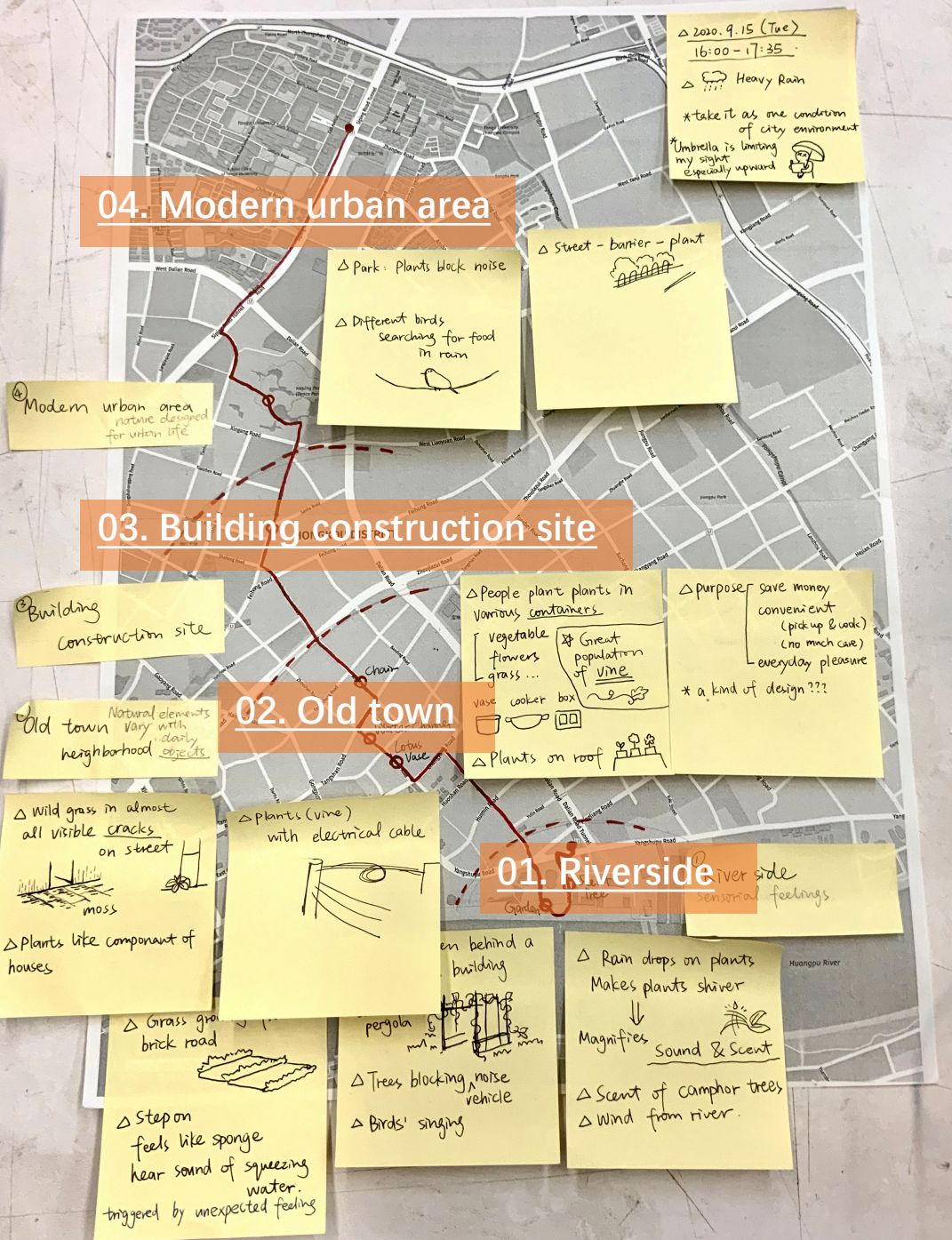
Feihong Rd. --- Hongzhen Old Street

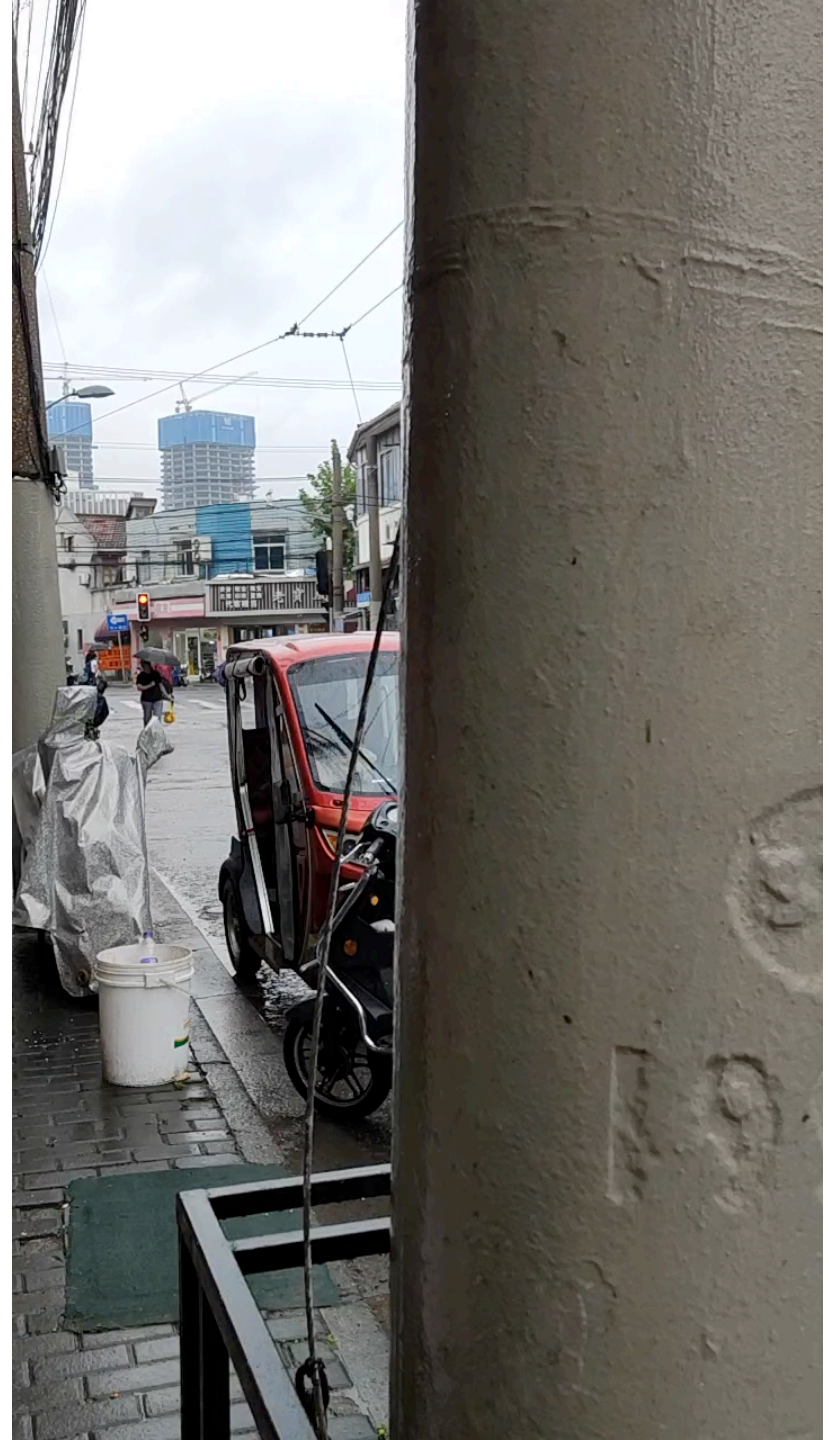


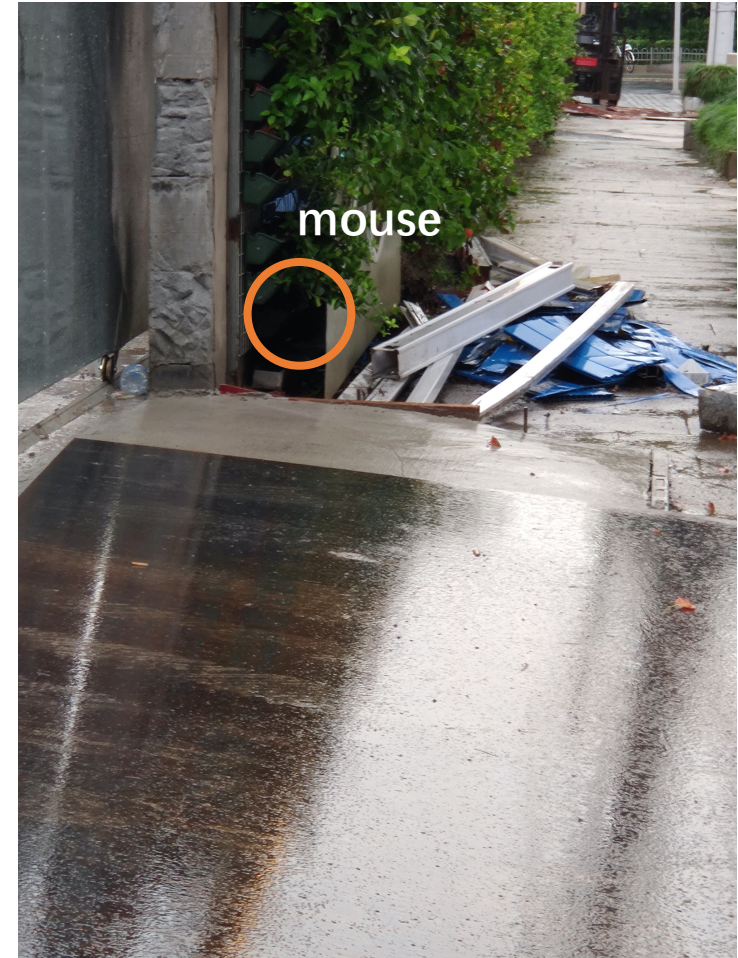
